Harpers Ferry National Historical Park

•**Saturday, April 15, 7:15 am** (note date in March Valley Views is incorrect)

Join us for a walk from the parking lot for Harpers Ferry National Historical Park off Route 340 down to Harpers Ferry. We will leave by 7:30 and walk down from the NPS parking lot, botanizing and birding as we go. We'll walk into Harpers Ferry and take the park service shuttle back up the hill. With luck we should find some early migrants and residents. Experienced birders and novices are sure to enjoy this trip and hopefully there will be lots of good birds. Please dress appropriately – whatever the weather is going to be!

Wednesday Morning Walks in April

PVAS will conduct a series of weekly morning bird walks along the C&O Canal across from Shepherdstown during April. They'll be held rain or shine every Wednesday during the month from 8:00 am to 10:00 am. Anyone interested is welcome to participate.

Participants will meet by 8:00 am in the C&O Canal parking lot along Canal Road south of the new James Rumsey Bridge that connects Shepherdstown and Sharpsburg. (From MD route 34 just east of bridge, turn onto Canal Road by the red barn. Follow Canal Road about .5 mile to the parking lot on the left.) The walks will offer an opportunity to see migrating birds as well as resident and wintering woodpeckers, ducks, and sparrows. Some of the early returning migrants likely to be seen are Tree Swallows, Northern Rough-winged Swallows, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, Wood Thrushes, Yellow-throated Warblers, Palm Warblers, Black-and-white Warblers, Louisiana Waterthrushes, and Common Yellowthroats.

President's Perch

Hello Everyone! As this is being written Spring is popping out all over, and our warm-season feathered friends are arriving in bunches. I've got redwing blackbirds on my feeder and quite a flock of robins all over. If you would like some help checking out our Spring migrants, Nancy Kirschbaum is offering some midweek birding opportunities (see page 1) and Patsy and Ken Hunter have several field trips planned (page 1). Our Yankauer Nature Preserve is open every day and offers beautiful trails for hiking, birding and botanizing and will again host a Spring Wildflower Festival on April 22.

Our PVAS Birdseed Sale profits are providing Camp Scholarships again this year to several environmentally oriented camps in West Virginia. Be sure to encourage the young folks in your life to apply (see article page 3).

Board Restructuring. As promised in my last month's column, I want to fill everyone in on the Board Restructuring that some of us have spent a lot of time on for over a year now. It has become apparent, as the years have rolled along, that our Yankauer Nature Preserve is a focal point within PVAS that gives us the opportunity to demonstrate in many ways what we—the Potomac Valley Audubon Society—are about. The Preserve gives us the opportunity to provide environmental education to children and adults, to display environmental ethics, and also preserves a piece of habitat for wild things. With that in mind, our Board of Directors decided that we had to find a better way to organize ourselves—one that would integrate Yankauer more fully into PVAS, strengthen its management, and strengthen the management of all our other endeavors. We set up a Board Restructuring Committee to look into the organization of other Audubon Chapters with similar programs to see how they structured themselves, and to come back with a recommendation to the Board. The results of those efforts are reflected in the draft "New PVAS Board Structure at a Glance" document that is enclosed in this newsletter. The entire restructuring plan, which includes Board position descriptions and Committee descriptions and responsibilities, is on our website for your review and comment (www.potomacaudubon.org). The new structure creates an Executive Committee (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, & Past President) that will oversee and coordinate the day-to-day operations of PVAS, including Yankauer.

The new structure also establishes a new staff position of Executive Director who will have immediate responsibility for those day-to-day operations, again including Yankauer, in close consultation with the Executive Committee. (It is our expectation that our current Yankauer Director, Kristin Alexander, will take this post.)

The idea behind these structural changes is to free the full Board of Directors from routine matters so they can concentrate on big-picture policy issues. You will see that the new structure also establishes a new set of functional committees that will focus on everything from Education to Publicity to Land and Facilities Management. This committee lineup more accurately reflects our current activities and needs, and it is at this level that we hope much of the real work of PVAS will be done—and where much of the organization's real energy will reside.

We intend for these committees to be very active. Board members will serve on them but they will not necessarily chair them; instead, the committees will be made up largely of non-Board members and some or many of them may in fact be chaired by non-Board members. Our goal is to use the committees to recruit and engage individuals who want to help PVAS in various ways and to varying degrees but do not have the time or inclination to serve on the Board. The key word here will be "flexibility"—between the Board and the committees, there will now be a place for everyone who wants to be a part of PVAS.

This restructuring does not change anything that we do but it does change the way we are organized, and that change will require a vote by the Membership of PVAS. Here is the proposed timeline for moving toward that vote:

- The PVAS Board of Directors is now reviewing the Restructuring Plan, and will provide comments to the Board Restructuring Committee.
- By the time you receive this newsletter, the Board should have voted to accept a final version of the Plan.
- The Constitution and By-Laws will be rewritten to reflect the restructuring of the Board during April and May.
- The new Plan and amended Constitution and By-Laws will be voted on at the Annual Meeting in May, as will the new Board of Directors.

Board Nominations. Meanwhile, the Board earlier this year appointed the Board Restructuring Committee to serve as this year's Nominating Committee with the idea that we would begin to make a transition toward this new structure as we put together a list of nominations for this year's Board.

Note Two current Board members have another year left in their terms and will continue to serve on the Board in the coming year. They are: David Eldridge and Sharon Stephan. The positions that we have previously listed as "Special Contacts," such as Newsletter Editor, Web Master, and Wildlife Rescue Coordinator will continue to exist, but for organizational purposes they will be folded into appropriate committees.

If each of us contributes a little, it makes everyone's job easier AND increases PVAS' ability to serve our community. So let me know how you can help.

Summer Camp Reunion and Open House




