Bruce Lemmert has been a Virginia Game warden assigned to Loudoun County since 1989. In 1996 Bruce was selected as the Virginia Game Warden of the Year. In 1997 Bruce was chosen as the Wildlife Officer of the Year for the North American Wildlife Enforcement Officer's Association and in 2002 he was the recipient of the Guy Bradley Award, from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Prior to becoming a game warden, Bruce served Franklin County, Virginia as their Director of Parks and Recreation and as the Assistant County Administrator.

Bruce earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Forestry and Wildlife Management from Virginia Tech.

WV Legislative Action Alert

Senator John Unger first initiated action on a water use bill for West Virginia this legislative session. Unger's bill was at first rejected by the Senate but he has since been joined by Governor Bob Wise with a slightly modified version, SB 163. The proposed Senate bill also has a companion bill in the House, HB 4026. The bill proposes a public policy of protection and conservation of water resources, it mandates a three year consumptive study, creates a special revenue fund, and establishes enforcement action against high-volume users that do not participate in the study.

It is expected that the Senate Natural Resources Committee (SNRC) will take up SB 163 on Monday, January 26, 2004 so a legislative action alert has been distributed urging people to contact members of the SNRC and urge them to support passage of Senate Bill 163. State Senators of note in this area include John Unger, who already supports the bill; Senator Herb Snyder, hbsnyder@mail.wvnet.edu; Senator Walt Helmick, whelmick@mail.wvnet.edu; and Mike Ross, who has no listed e-mail address. Special note are Senator Walt Helmick and Senator Herb Snyder who serve on the SNRC.

enjoys a positive and prestigious community image. Come help us fulfill the mission statement that we proudly display on the front page of this newsletter.



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Great Backyard Bird Count

– February 13-16, 2004



A cooperative project developed and managed by National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. This project draws attention to the 80 percent of residential land area having private lawns that contribute to habitat for migrating and overwintering birds. Anyone that

enjoys birding and/or birds can participate by making observations right in their own backyard and submitting a tally.

How to Participate:

1. Count the birds in your backyard, local park, or other natural area on one or all four count days, for at least 30 minutes.
2. Keep track of the highest number of individuals that you observe at any one time.
3. Keep separate records and fill out a checklist for each area.
4. Go to website – <http://www.birdsource.org>
5. Select West Virginia Checklist and submit your results.
6. The website has more detailed instructions on how to complete the checklist and will offer identification tips and answer your questions.
7. If possible please send a copy to Dale_nisbet@nps.gov and he will tabulate the totals received from our membership.
